COVID 19 STRENGTHENED MARITIME BORDER RESTRICTIONS

to support the operation of Customs and others implementing the Maritime Border Order.

We propose some amendments to the Maritime Border Order

- The Maritime Border Order came into force on 30 June 2020.
- The Order prohibits all foreign vessels from coming to New Zealand, with exemptions for
 - vessels carrying New Zealanders and permanent residents (who are entitled to enter New Zealand)
 - commercial vessels (cargo and fishing, for example).
- Cabinet agreed that officials should review the order after one month of operation.
- Based on this review, we recommend strengthening and streamlining the Order in the following ways:
 - Earlier notification of intended arrival (one week vs 48 hours) to enable the risk to be better assessed and the health response planned and delivered.
 - o Transfers between ports/MIQ/airports to be done by MIQ staff.
 - Additional protections for port workers working around the vessels.
 - More options for entry for shore leave or to stay by allowing people on vessels to enter New Zealand when health assessments and testing are completed.
 - O Health will assess the health of and test:
 - port workers
 - those arriving on vessels, where someone wishes to enter New Zealand.
- In addition, Customs will be able to use its existing powers to direct a vessel to go to a
 different port. This will be used in cases, most likely for yachts, where the required isolation
 cannot be safely or securely provided at the nominated port of arrival.
